1. **(c)** The grape variety the wine is made from, Beaunenois is the traditional name for Chardonnay in Chablis.

- 2. **(b)** 1826.
- 3. Pinot Gris.
- 4. Bouzeron is the only Commune wine to make wines from the Aligoté grape. All the other wines made from Aligoté are from the regional Bourgogne appellation, with one really peculiar exception!
- 5. It is the only Commune that can make Rosé wine with the Village Appellation name on the label. Therefore you can get Marsannay in Red, White and Rosé, while every other Commune Côte-d'Or can only make red and/or white. All other Rosé wines in Burgundy, other than Marsannay, are from the regional Bourgogne appellation.
 - 6. (a) Different parcels of it are classified as Village level, Premier Cru & Grand Cru.
 - 7. Tonnellerie Cadus.
 - 8. Crème de cassis with Beaujolais.
 - 9. (a) Chestnut repels spiders.
- 10. The wines are made from Sauvignon, Sauvignon Blanc and Sauvignon Gris are both permitted.
 - 11. (d) Château du Clos de Vougeot.
 - 12. (b) Chardonnay.
 - 13. Saint-Vérand with a final 'd'.
 - 14. **(b)** Romanèche-Thorins and Chénas, the latter is a little way away from the vineyards that make the wine called Chénas. The wines were labelled as Romanèche-Thorins until 1936 when the Moulin-à-Vent appellation was created.
 - 15. (c) The village where the grapes are grown.
